



Second Lesson 1 Timothy 6:6-19

Lector A reading from the First Letter to Timothy.

There is great gain in godliness combined with contentment; for we brought nothing into the world, so that we can take nothing out of it; but if we have food and clothing, we will be content with these. But those who want to be rich fall into temptation and are trapped by many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, and in their eagerness to be rich some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pains.

But as for you, man of God, shun all this; pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the eternal life, to which you were called and for which you made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses. In the presence of God, who gives life to all things, and of Christ Jesus, who in his testimony before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, I charge you to keep the commandment without spot or blame until the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ, which he will bring about at the right time—he who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords. It is he alone who has immortality and dwells in unapproachable light, whom no one has ever seen or can see; to him be honor and eternal dominion. Amen.

As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not to be haughty, or to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life.







Invitation and Communion

All are invited to come forward during the sharing of Holy Communion.

Where can I go to receive bread and wine by drinking from the common cup?

Please come to the left side (lectern side) of the altar rail; return to your seat via the stairs in the sacristy.

Where can I go to receive bread and wine by intinction (having a minister dip the host in wine and place it in your hand)?

Please come to the right side (pulpit side) of the altar rail; return to your seat via the stairs by the baptismal font.

Where can I go to receive only the bread?

Please come to either location and tell the server "only bread."

Where can I go to receive gluten-free bread?

Please come to either location and ask for gluten free.

Where can I go to receive a blessing?

Please come to either location and cross your arms over your chest.

How can I ask for communion to be brought to me?

Please ask an usher to receive by intinction in your seat.

Difficult Conversations is an adult forum series that seeks to empower people to have conversations that are sometimes hard to have. Whether it is a discussion about politics, religion, or the quality of the food at a restaurant, sometimes we disagree. In fact, we often disagree. How should we, then, as Christians, approach situations in which we inevitably will hold different opinions? In this forum series, we will talk about why we have difficult discussions, and provide in a safe space to practice the art of disagreement.

Each Other's Keeper Beginning in October, this six-part series designed by The Rev. Marc D. Smith, Ph.D. Bishop's Deputy for Gun Violence Prevention in the Episcopal Diocese of Missouri explores different ways that violence presents itself. Designed to stimulate reflection, thoughtful conversation, and action, the six parts are: Violence in Scripture, Violence in American Popular Culture, Gun Violence: A Public Health Crisis, Youth Bullying and Suicide, Domestic Abuse and Sexualized Violence, and Forgiveness and Reconciliation.

Bible Study will begin with Philippians. It is very positive and uplifting in a very difficult period of Paul's life.

Quarterly Forum with the Clergy will provide a venue for parishioners to ask questions and explore ideas in an informal, information setting.

Health Topics with the Parish Nurse: Our Parish Nurse, Tristan Carpenter, will present a series of public health topics beginning with information on Communicable Diseases: Cold and Flu.

Intergenerational Wreath Making A wonderful time for all parishioners of all ages to begin their Advent preparations by making a wreath.

Sharing Traditions will be a holiday celebration where we have a chance to share fun and, perhaps delicious, traditions that have brought meaning and joy to our Christmas seasons over the years.
